
Age is a number, not a limitation. By challenging internalized ageism,

### 2:00 p.m. Recognizing Deep Fakes

**Hafiz Malik**, professor of electrical and computer engineering in the College of Engineering and Computer Science at the University of Michigan–Dearborn.

Due to the instantaneous nature of social media politics today, the only way to combat fake multimedia is to detect it in close-to-real time. Malik develops tools to fight against fake multimedia. He has created a method to detect computer-generated audio at near 100% accuracy and is now turning to fake multimedia detection in real time. His current tools can differentiate real from fake audio at the microscopic level with specific markers. These tools can be used by newsrooms, social media platforms and smart speakers. Malik will discuss the current state of fake media and the strategies used to identify it, as well as approaches to verify authenticity.

# March 13 — Keeping Older Drivers Safely on the Road: Resources and Training for Understanding Advanced Driver Assistance Systems and Automated Vehicle Technologies

**Lisa J. Molnar,** Ph.D., is a research associate professor emerita at the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute. Dr. Molnar has over 35 years of experience conducting research on transportation safety

and mobility at the U-M Transportation Research Institute. The development of advanced driver assistance systems (ADAS) and automated vehicle (AV) technologies hold great promise for helping older adults maintain safe mobility. However, challenges remain in ensuring that ADAS and AV technologies are accessible, acceptable, affordable and otherwise inclusive for older adults. This presentation will focus on recent efforts to improve older adults' understanding of ADAS and AV technologies. You will learn about relevant ADAS and AV resources available through the State of Michigan's website *Safe Drivers Smart Options* and a recently completed project, funded by the Center for Connected and Automated Vehicles, on ADAS and AV training conducted by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute. The objective of the project was to develop and pilot-test a training curriculum to help older adults become more familiar with the functioning and operation of ADAS and AV technologies through classroom and closed-track demonstrations conducted at U-M's Mcity test facility.

**April 10** — *Saving Songbirds*. Presented by Marissa Jardine. Ms. Jardine is the Clinical Manager of the Bird Center of Michigan. The Bird Center provides wildlife rehabilitation services for injured and orphaned birds. Her talk will focus on the spring migration of songbirds, window collisions, cat-caught birds and orphaned babies. Jardine will share tips and advice regarding protecting songbirds, as well as what to do if you need assistance. Michigan is home to many migrating bird species, especially in the spring. This will be an important talk, regardless of where you live--in the country or a high-rise in the city.

# March 13 — Why Incompetence Fails to Recognize Itself

**David Dunning**, professor of psychology in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, and faculty associate in the Research Center for Group Dynamics, Institute for Social Research.



Professor Dunning will discuss the psychology underlying the notorious "Dunning-Kruger Effect," a condition in which people remain unaware of their incompetence and ignorance, thereby being left with illusions of expertise they do not have (a condition that visits all of us sooner or later). He touches on its implications for health, education, the workplace, politics, as well as the digital age. Dunning (with Justin Kruger) received the 2023 Grawemeyer Award in Psychology for the work, which has been featured internationally on National Public Radio Public Broadcasting Service, The British Broadcasting Service, The *New York Times* and other venues—even *Doonesbury*.

### April 10 — Memory: How It Works and How to Improve It



**Thad Polk**, Samuel D. Epstein Collegiate Professor of Psychology, Arthur F. Thurnau Professor, and professor of psychology in the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts. He also serves as chair of the Cognition and Cognitive Neuroscience Area at the Michigan Neuroscience Institute.

Professor Polk will present findings from the Computational & Cognitive Neuroscience Lab on the neural architecture that underlies cognition; that is, the set of fixed neural structures and processes that give rise to cognition. What are the parts, how do they work and how do they

interact to produce the mind? Ultimately, researchers aim to understand how the cognitive architecture is determined (e.g., which aspects are genetic), how the architecture changes as a result of experience and normal aging and how it normally functions. He will discuss brain aging and what can be done about it, including how the brain changes as we age and steps we can take to age more gracefully.

# May 15 — Mcity and the Future of Mobility



**Sue Carney,** Director of Marketing and Communications for Mcity at the University of Michigan, overseeing strategy, planning and execution of media relations, digital and social media and thought leadership initiatives.

Ms. Carney will discuss activities at Mcity and how the work being done there could improve the quality of life for us all. Mcity is an interdisciplinary private-public partnership that brings together industry, government and academia to advance transportation safety, sustainability, equity and accessibility. This is a world-class, purpose-built test facility for

connected and autonomous vehicles and technologies, including mixed-reality testing capabilities and data tools powered by artificial intelligence. Mcity is a makerspace—a hub for research, development and deployment of next-generation mobility innovations to the real world.



# **January Meeting Recap**

Visit our YouTube Channel to view the January 16 Learn & Grow presentation, <u>"Stay Safe: Avoiding</u> <u>Identity Theft and Financial Fraud,"</u> presented by UMCU's financial education manager, Mark Munzenberger.

2:00 PM Seminar—"Tax challenges have taken many forms over the millennia, leading to revolts, unintended outcomes and ingenious avoidance schemes," noted Joel Slemrod, U-M economist and tax policy expert, at his Jan. 16 presentation—"Tax Follies and Wisdom Through the Ages."



Tax grievances were at the core of the American Revolution, the English Civil War and the French Revolution. Who should bear tax burdens remains an enduring question.

Slemrod used colorful stories and images from his book—*Rebellion, Rascals, and Revenue: Tax Follies and Wisdom Through the Ages*—to illustrate how rulers use taxes to motivate people, change behavior and promote fairness, with mixed results. He also talked about enforcement mechanisms and how people evade paying.

In 1830, an English poll tax led to a revolt by Wat Tyler, whose followers marched on London, beheaded officials and opened prisons. The king initially conceded to the rebels' demands, but Tyler was killed the next day, and the revolt died off. In 1989, the Tories enacted a poll tax that led to noncompliance, a riot in London and the ouster of former Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

Before the English introduced the income tax in 1799, it taxed luxury goods only the rich could afford to try to achieve some progressivity. Among items taxed in Georgian England were carriages, racehorses, servants, hats, and wigs and hair powder.

The U.S. ratified the 16<sup>th</sup> Amendment in 1913, which allowed for an income tax. The tax was enacted in 1914 with a top rate of 7 percent. Fueled by the costs of World War I, the top rate rose to 77 percent by 1918.

Slemrod said the objective of taxation—think taxing smoking and plastic bags—is often to change behavior. In ancient Greece and Rome, a tax was imposed on unmarried men over a certain age to encourage marriage. In some cases, a bachelor could avoid the tax if he could prove he had asked a woman to marry him and had been rejected. In Argentina, this gave rise to "professional lady rejectors"—women who for a modest sum agreed to swear that they had spurned an offer of marriage.



# Wednesday, February 26

Kate Quinn's *The Rose Code* is a heart-stopping World War II story of three female code breakers assigned to Bletchley Park (BP). BP appeared to be just another mansion situated in a quiet country village. In fact, it was one of Britain's most important assets during World War II. BP is where hundreds of men and women worked to break Axis encrypted messages, the Enigma codes. The stories of these three women highlight the social changes brought on by World War II, especially concerning gender dynamics. The war tore the three apart. The peace reunites them, as they must work together to root out the BP spy after the war is over.



# **UMRA Reads December Recap**

In December, we met to discuss *The Toledo War—The First Michigan-Ohio Rivalry* by former Ann Arbor News editor, Don Faber. This book provided a good Michigan history lesson for us and was full of facts surrounding the 1835 boundary war between Ohio and Michigan. It was more a political war than an actual physical war, even though some shots were fired, and one Michigan man was stabbed. The discussion surrounded the various facts members pulled out of the book. The original southern border of the Michigan Territory was defined by the Northwest Ordinance of 1787. A U.S. attorney general verified this fact as the rightful law, but Ohio—already granted statehood—disagreed. Ohio's votes in the next election were important to Andrew Jackson, so when Michigan applied for statehood in 1832, Ohio's objections delayed statehood until 1837. The Ohioans called Michiganders wolverines, vicious and ornery critters. Michigan liked the name because many thought it cunning and fearless. This dispute was the beginning of the rivalry that is reenacted each fall on the gridiron. Ann Arbor was involved in this dispute with the "Frostbitten Convention" held here. The discovery of the "Lost Peninsula" was an intriguing part of our discussion. You can listen to the full UMRA Reads *The Toledo War* discussion via our podcasts here.
